Why are values important?



Our values inform our thoughts words and actions. They help us create the type of future we want to experience. When we use our values to make a decision, we make a deliberate choice to focus on what is important to us. When values are shared like Marist Values, it builds a family spirit and connection amongst people.

The Marist Brothers have schools and projects in 82 different countries around the world. Although there are different languages and cultures they all share the same values. Marist schools and projects have Marist Spirit!

The Five Values of Marist Education are:


- 1. Presence

We give time to people.

We take time to say hello and be friendly to everyone we meet. We are prepared to spend time with people and show interest in what they do.

We make sure there is a place for everyone and all are included.

We never leave anybody out of activities and include anyone who seems to be alone, making all feel that they belong to the group.

We get to know and respect each person individually.

We take time to ask people questions about their interests and views on different things. We chat to people we don't normally hang around with outside of school.

We have a positive attitude towards each other that helps us all to grow in self- confidence.

We always have a good word to say to encourage a fellow student, even something small, like telling him/her, they are friendly, or a good football player, or good at a particular subject.

We set a good example for others.

Like when you do and say kind things in school to others and younger students see this as the way they should also behave.

We are attentive and welcoming towards others.

When a new student joins the class, we are prepared to take time to talk to him/her and help him/her to find their way around the school, even if it means missing out on our favourite sport at lunchtime.

We earn trust, and we help others to be open with us.

To earn trust you have to show you can be trusted. For example,

when someone tells you something personal about themselves and they ask you not to tell anyone else, you don't unless you think they are in any danger. Then they know they can trust you and will be able to talk to you again.

We make the most of each day with others in our activities.

Be always kind and courteous to everyone you meet whether in class, playing games, going somewhere or just chatting to friends.

We allow God to be present in our lives.

We say a prayer for all our families. We pray for those who are sick or who have died.

TO DO:

Have you experienced the value of 'Presence in your school from other students, teachers or other staff? Write examples from your experience or situations where you have seen this happen with other people.

Take a few moments in class to pray in silence for all these intentions. Read and write a paragraph on one of the parables in the gospels where Jesus cured somebody. E.g. Gospel of John 5-15: Story of the healing of the paralyzed man.

We undertake to build community in our school.

A community is a group of people who have something in common like a school. A Marist community is where we have common values that we put into practice like; welcoming everyone, pride in our work, having respect for each other, being honest.

We share life's successes and failures and always support one another. We are prepared to talk and listen to our fellow students and are interested in what is going on in their lives. We congratulate

others on their achievements in school or outside of school and support them if they are having difficulties with study, or a friendship, or at home.

We set clear standards of mutual respect and tolerance.

We respect the right of other students to express ideas and opinions that are different from our own views. We have respect for everybody in our community.

We believe in each person's innate goodness, not confusing the person with his/her behaviour.

Anyone can lose their way sometimes and they deserve a second chance. Don't give up on someone just because they have made a mistake and allow them to make a fresh start.

We give most attention to those whose needs are greatest.

We are prepared to help a fellow student who may be finding life difficult. We support a student where a family member has died.

We encourage leadership based on working as a team and sharing responsibility for what we do.

We get involved in activities that make the school a better place like joining sports teams, helping out our teachers and fellow students.

All are equal in our Marist family. Everyone is different and we all try to reach our potential.

We set high standards for ourselves and support one another to achieve what each of us is capable of achieving in school and later in life.

We are genuine and straightforward.

For example a friend who has your best interests at heart and will always tell you what you should do in a given situation for your own benefit.

We are honest in our relationships.

We tell the truth, which is the right thing to do, and share how we feel about something that is important to us. Remember that you should only say something if you think it will be of benefit to the person.

We say what we believe and show it.

We help a fellow student against bullying and stand up for students being bullied even when it is not popular to do so.

We are humble and modest in what we do, 'we do good quietly'.

We help a fellow student in some way because we know it's the right thing to do and not because we want to get praise for it.

We appreciate family and friends

more than possessions and fame.

We do simple acts of kindness for our family and friends to thank them for their support. We spend time with them rather than just looking for the most expensive iPhone.

We have a social conscience, social responsibility and are

concerned about the future of the world.

We support non-uniform days for various charities. We have respect for property, keeping it clean and graffiti free. We recycle goods to protect the environment.

Work helps us to develop values and to meet the challenges of life, be that losing a job, sickness, end of a friendship, death of family member or friends.

As Christians we believe that God gives meaning to our lives and helps us everyday.

We are people of work, ready to 'roll up our sleeves'. How do you think you are working at your studies at the moment? What is stopping you from achieving the grades you are capable of at this time? What support would help you to do better, for example, help with homework, mentoring, study skills class? Do you need to put a plan into action and help to do it?

We are kind, constant and persevering in our daily work. We always try to reach our full potential in every area of our lives

We can often achieve more by working as a team. What teams are you a member of in or outside of school? What qualities/skills do you bring to the team?

We take time to invest in exploring all options for our future.

Have you explored with your teachers or parents what subject options, courses, training are open to you after you leave school. What further action do you need to take to prepare for this?

TO DO:

Is the Love of Work an important value in your school? Write some examples of when you have seen this value being lived out in your school Read and write a paragraph on the message in the gospel story of the Talents. Gospel Matthew 25, 14-30.





We care for each other like a mother does for her child. Mothers will go to any lengths to care, protect, encourage, support, and forgive their children. As Marists we adopt this approach to everybody we meet.

Like Mary we are open to new challenges even if we are a little afraid.

Name any person whom you admire for what they have achieved? Why do you admire them? Did they have to face any challenges

in life? How did they overcome them? Name any challenges you had to take on in life so far. What did you learn from the experience?

We develop the ability to express our feelings appropriately.

What are feelings? They are how we feel inside after events.

They include reactions such as anger, sadness, happiness and many more. We must remember that feelings in themselves are neither right or wrong, the important thing is how we express them and how we act on them.

We should not hurt anyone else by reacting in the wrong way. We need to take care of our thoughts and feelings and talk to somebody we trust about our feelings and thoughts, especially if we feel very unhappy.

We see Mary, like us, as a person on a journey of faith. Mary believed in God and had the confidence to do what he asked her to do. We respect that people believe different things but we remain open to the possibilities that God will present to us in life.

TO DO:

From time to time, do teachers, staff and students live their lives 'In the way of Mary' in your school? Write about some of the examples you can think of and when you have seen them happen.

IDENTIFYING YOUR PERSONAL VALUES

Sometimes our values aren't totally clear to us, and it may take a bit of reflection to figure out the principles, beliefs or ideas that are most important to us.

To help identify your values, spend some time answering each of the following questions:

- 1. Think of 2 people you really respect. What characteristics do you admire in them and why?
- 2. If your home were on fire (and all the people and pets in the house were safe), what 3 objects would you save and why?
- 3. If you could change one thing in your community, what would it be and why? What about in the world in general?
- 4. What issues get you the most motivated when you talk about them, or hear others talking about? Why do those issues effect you in this way?
- 5. Think of a moment in your life that was really satisfying or fulfilling for you. What was that moment and what made you feel that way about it?

Now look over your responses.

- Do any themes emerge?
- What principles, beliefs or ideas stand out most in your answers? These are likely some of your personal values.
- If you are still unsure complete the 'My Personal Values Activity'

Looking at your Top 5 values, do you always act in ways that are consistent with those values?

Chances are, you don't - since most of us don't always act in accordance with our values. Why not? Sometimes it's difficult to do so in day-to-day life, especially if we're not always consciously aware of our values. Other times we are working towards a value, like completing your education, but aren't quite there yet.

One way to increase the extent to which we act in line with our values is to clearly identify what they are, and then work to keep them more in our conscious awareness.

You can do that by:

Spending some time thinking, about why each value is important to you, and the actions you've engaged in or decisions you've made recently that were similar to that value.

TO DO:

- Look back at the Marist values and match each of your values to one of them. Get a picture of yourself and draw all your values around it. Frame it and keep it somewhere you can see everyday.
- Create a concrete plan for specific things you can do to live your values more explicitly (e.g., making a plan to volunteer with a local program if you want to make a positive contribution to your community, or help out in your school). This can become an important element in setting and achieving your goals too.

PRAYERFUL REFLECTION

As we come to the end of this module we ask you to take time to reflect on all you have learned.
