# Irish Marist Brothers Patron Commission

A new Irish Patron Commission has been formed to begin a process of handing over patronage of the Irish schools to a new body. Part of the brief of the Patron Commission is to review possible suitable options and to make recommendations to the Irish Marist Brothers Trust.

From October 2023, the Marist Brothers in Ireland will form part of the District of West Central Europe (with Scotland/UK, The Netherlands, Belgium and Germany). The District will be under the jurisdiction of the Province of L'hermitage.

It is intended that the Commission work with the Mission Council and the Director of Marist Education to promote Marist Characteristic spirit in the schools. The Commission will develop a Spirit Charter which will outline and expand what it means to continue the Marist Brothers charism in our schools and put structures in place to support the ongoing implementation of the ethos.

Thank you to Marist Leaders Donal McDermott and Killian Redmond for the fabulous music during the mass.

Leaders at Marist College Athlone recently connected once again with another Marist School in Mexico. In an effort to stay connected with the wider Marist global network of schools a live call between Marist College, Athlone and Instituto Queretano, Mexico was organised. Marist Leaders got to share aspects they love about their own school and compare with those in Mexico. Both schools discussed upcoming events in their respective schools such as Science and sporting events. The live call was held on Ash Wednesday so the catholic symbolism and traditions of this significant day were interestingly compared by both groups. #### Year 2 Leaders:



#### **Around the Labyrinth**

Ash Wednesday 23, Westerhelling

Westerhelling is a place where your experiences are allowed to flow as they come, or where you remember that is life. So too during «Around the Labyrinth» on Ash Wednesday evening, 22 February.

Beforehand, I had been looking forward to Ash Wednesday. I was planning to fast during Lent. My fasting would mean that I would restrain myself from scheduling appointments in the evenings, leaving more space for creative activities or whatever came to mind. So for me this year, Ash Wednesday was mostly about marking the beginning of Lent - or at least I thought so. With a full head, I arrived. At the door, I was welcomed in an atmosphere of attention and silence. Through the windows I could already see the warm glow of the fireplace. near which I sat down on a meditation bench. I felt small: I am quick to feel that I am not allowed to be there as I am, and I felt the same then. During the evening,

this changed. We lit candles while saying a word. Everyone chose something appropriate; for me it was «small». I was allowed to feel small and express that! That was the beginning of the connection with myself that evening.

Many beautiful things were shared. The warmth, the light and crackling of the fireplace, Taizé music, a poem by Rilke, candles, singing and especially a lot of silence. There was a visualisation centred on waiting, patience. We wrote on notes what stopped us from trusting. My head was too full to surrender to the visualisation, but the beauty of Westerhelling is that you experience that there is no programme to be completed, but that everything is an invitation or reaching out - I experienced that it is totally okay not to be able to participate fully, and this in itself gave me a sense of lightness.

Singing, holding candles, we walked through the garden to the labyrinth in the

dark. In the dark, the path of the labyrinth was difficult to follow, even though it was marked with lights. This gave me a sense of connection with the

group; in this darkness, I followed the trail of the person in front of me, and the person after me followed me. The connection was strengthened when «around the labryinth» we threw the notes into the fire pit and used the ashes to paint each other's faces. Meanwhile, there was singing in a circle. In me, the fullness in my head had now given way to openness and joy, and I gladly surrendered to what could emerge in the group.

Surprisingly, the Ash Wednesday theme mostly passed me by that evening, even though it had emerged in such a creative way in ritual action, song and text. In retrospect, that evening turned out to be not about marking the beginning of Lent as I had thought beforehand, but about connecting with life in myself, people, in a place where you are allowed to flow.



Excitingly our own province of West Central Europe has become very involved and we



went for it and now i'm sure it was the right decision.

- As a Marist, i feel like i'm at home in the whole world. Because every place can feel like home when there are people who you connect with and who are there for you. And for me, that's a big part of the Marist spirit.
- I think my friends and family would describe my as a calm person that rather likes to listen than to talk. My hobbies vary from social work to music and climbing, so they probably would say i'm versatile too.
- An event that influenced my life and the person i'm today is when i left my friends and family for a year to work on a farm 700 km away from home. It was the first time i was responsible for myself and had to deal with whole knew surroundings and people, and that really made my heart and inner strength grow.
- In my free time i love playing the guitar or the piano, that always calms me down at the and



of the day. And i'm really grateful for my friends and family, so i spend as much time as possible with them.
